

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JULIUS & ESTHER STULBERG





In 1920, Julius Stulberg was brought to Montreal when his parents emigrated from Kieselien, Poland. The family eventually settled in Marshall, Michigan. Julius received degrees from and taught at Michigan State University, where he also met his future wife, Esther Leiberman. The Stulberg bond with Kalamazoo was forged in 1941 when he accepted the post of conductor of the newly established Junior Symphony.

In 1945, the Stulberg family moved to Kalamazoo when Julius joined the faculty of Western Michigan University. Throughout his life, his wife Esther was his support and helpmate. Following Julius' death at the age of 61 in 1974, she was the driving force behind the establishment of the Competition, which memorializes his life's passions. After Esther's death in 2001, a dedicated Board of Directors, a corps of volunteers and the Stulberg family assumed the mantle of responsibility for the competition.

Today, the Stulberg is one of the longest-standing string competitions in the country and is unique among music competitions due to its focus on young string musicians, its strong reputation, and high caliber of judges. Over the years, more than 2,500 musicians have participated in the Stulberg, and more than one hundred have been awarded a medal. Many have gone on to illustrious careers in the fields of music performance and education. Throughout its history, the Stulberg has attracted world-renowned musicians to Kalamazoo to serve as Competition judges and Master Class instructors. Through its Master Classes and Education Outreach, the Stulberg extends its impact by providing free learning opportunities for local musicians and audiences.





KALAMAZOO SYMPHONY ORCHESTRA

The Kalamazoo Symphony Orchestra (KSO) has been serving the Kalamazoo community through outstanding listening and learning experiences for over 100 years. With a vision to make symphonic music a part of everyday life throughout our community, the KSO has been reaching out to our community to define what that means and is diligently reforming the organization to meet those goals and realize our vision now.

The Kalamazoo Symphony Orchestra is the state's third-largest orchestra, with a total of 250 employees from Kalamazoo and surrounding areas. The KSO performs high-quality symphonic music, fosters audiences of tomorrow, and elevates the careers of local musicians.

Today, we seek to expand our reach and learn from our community so that we can be equitable and inclusive of all people. We are committed to the promises we made in our strategic plan and to our mission of serving this community through outstanding musical listening and learning experiences. Under the leadership of Jessica Mallow Gulley, Executive Director and Music Director, Julian Kuerti, what began as one woman's dream 100 years ago has become, through the unwavering support of the Kalamazoo community, an integral part of the cultural and educational life of the region.

PRESENTING ORGANIZATIONS



KALAMAZOO JUNIOR SYMPHONY ORCHESTRA

Kalamazoo Philharmonia. The KJSO holds three annual performances in historic Chenery Auditorium, tours internationally, and offers a dynamic chamber music training program coached by area professional musicians.

Preparation for those hoping to one day join the Junior Symphony is provided by the three Prep String Orchestras and the Prep Winds. A distinguished KJSO alumna and noted pedagogue, Audrey Lipsey, is the director of all three Prep Orchestras. The Prep Winds Ensemble is directed by respected performing and teaching artists Jesse Williams and Luke Conklin.

The KJSO is financed entirely by individual and business patrons, state and local grants, ticket sales, and special fund raising events. All KJSO programs are tuition free so that every student, regardless of means, can participate. KJSO's alumni go on to academic and career success at astonishing rates, and some can even be found in major American and international orchestras, devoting their lives to the power of sharing music.

PRESENTING ORGANIZATIONS



WESTERN MICHIGAN UNIVERSITY ORCHESTRA

Under conductor Bruce Uchimura, the University Symphony performs orchestral masterworks, features internationally recognized and WMU faculty soloists, and collaborates with the WMU Grand Chorus and Department of Dance to present their season in Miller Auditorium and the Dalton Center Recital Hall. Orchestra members perform with WMU opera and musical theatre productions, and the orchestra has performed at high schools, colleges, and various performance venues throughout Michigan.

The University Symphony Orchestra is open by audition to all WMU students. It primarily comprises undergraduate and graduate music majors who take pride in the professional level of the ensemble's rehearsals and performances. Competitive auditions are held each semester, sectional rehearsals involve skilled coaches and teachers, and both individual practice and score study is expected outside of scheduled rehearsals.

The University Symphony Orchestra began in 1945 and has had eight conductors: Julius Stulberg (1945-68), Herbert Butler (1968-83), Anthony Elliott (1983–87), Richard Suddendorf (1987–90), Robert Whaley (1990–95), Eric Shumsky (1995–98), and Bruce Uchimura (1998–2019, 2022-), and Andrew Koehler (2019-22).

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GRYPHON TRIO

Gryphon Trio is firmly established as one of the world's preeminent piano trios. For more than 25 years, it has earned acclaim for and impressed international audiences with its highly refined, dynamic, and memorable performances. The Trio's repertoire ranges from traditional to contemporary, and from European classicism to modern-day multimedia. It is committed to redefining chamber music for the 21st century.

Violinist Annalee Patipatanakoon, cellist Roman Borys, and pianist Jamie Parker are creative innovators with an appetite for discovery and new ideas. They have commissioned over 85 new works, and they frequently collaborate with other artists on projects that push the boundaries of Classical music.

The Trio tours regularly throughout North America and Europe. It enjoys long standing relationships with prominent festivals and arts incubators like Banff Centre for Arts and Creativity, Orford Music Academy, Music Toronto, Ottawa Chamberfest, and Festival del Lago International Academy of Music in Ajijic, Mexico. Gryphon Trio often performs triple concerti with the world's major symphony orchestras and smaller chamber orchestras.

Gryphon Trio's prolific recording catalogue includes 22 releases on Analekta, Naxos, and other labels; it is an encyclopaedia of works for the genre. Honours include 11 nominations and three Juno Awards for Classical Album of the Year in 2004, 2011, and most recently in 2019. In 2013, Canada Council for the Arts presented Gryphon Trio with the prestigious Walter Carsen Prize for Excellence in the Performing Arts.

The Gryphons are deeply committed to community engagement, education, and the development of next generation audiences and performers. They conduct masterclasses and workshops at universities and conservatories. They are ensemble-in-residence at the Isabel Bader Centre for Performing Arts in Kingston, Ontario, and artists-in-residence at Trinity College, University of Toronto. Since 2010, the Trio's ground breaking outreach program, Listen Up!, has inspired 16 Canadian communities to collaborate on large-scale multifaceted arts creation projects. The Trio leads Orford Music Academy's Piano Trio Workshop and directs the Classical Music Summer Programs at Banff Centre for Arts and Creativity.

From 2007 to 2020, Roman Borys was Artistic Director of the Ottawa Chamber Music Society; Annalee Patipatanakoon and Jamie Parker served as OCMS' Artistic Advisors. Mr. Parker is the Rupert E. Edwards Chair in Piano Performance at the University of Toronto Faculty of Music. Ms. Patipatanakoon is Associate Professor of Violin and Performance Area Chair of Strings.

Violinist Annalee Patipatanakoon is one of Canada's most respected performing artists. A graduate of Indiana University and the Curtis Institute of Music, Annalee is a laureate of the Queen Elisabeth Competition in Brussels, and a first prize winner of both the Canadian Music Competition and Eckhardt Gramatté National Music Competition.

Annalee is a founding member of three-time Juno Award-winning Gryphon Trio. She can be heard on 22 recordings on Analekta, Naxos, and other labels.

Annalee maintains a busy touring schedule across North America and Europe. From 2007 to 2020, she served as Artistic Advisor to the Ottawa Chamber Music Society. Annalee is currently Associate Professor of Violin and Performance Area Chair of Strings at University of Toronto Faculty of Music. She and Gryphon Trio members Roman Borys and Jamie Parker are ensemble-in-residence at the Isabel Bader Centre for Performing Arts in Kingston, Ontario and artists-in-residence at Trinity College, University of Toronto.

Equally in demand as a teacher of violin and chamber music, Annalee has conducted masterclasses at Rice University, Stanford University, Royal Conservatory of Music, Hochschule für Musik Mainz, Domaine Forget, Orford Music Academy, Tuckamore Festival and School, Mount Royal University, and many more.

With Gryphon Trio members Roman Borys and Jamie Parker, Annalee leads educational projects in music schools and communities across the country. These include the ensemble's flagship Listen Up! arts outreach program, with permanent hubs in Ottawa and Etobicoke; Orford Music Academy's Piano Trio Workshop; and the Classical Music Summer Programs at Banff Centre for Arts and Creativity.

JAMIE PARKER

Jamie Parker's achievements are both lengthy and impressive. His musical roots can be traced to the Vancouver Academy of Music and University of British Columbia, where he studied with Lee Kum Sing. He then went on to complete his master's and doctorate with Adele Marcus at The Juilliard School. Jamie continues the teaching tradition as the Rupert E. Edwards Chair in Piano Performance at University of Toronto Faculty of Music.

Beginning in 1984 with a first prize at the Eckhardt Gramatté National Music Competition, Jamie served notice that he was a rising star. The CBC concurred, selecting him winner of the 25th National Competition for Young Performers. The Virginia P. Moore Prize (known today as the Virginia Parker Prize) soon followed, further solidifying Jamie's place as one of Canada's best young classical musicians.

On-air programs repeatedly seek out his performances. Jamie has made frequent appearances on CBC, Bravo, Global Television Network, Much, and media platforms around the world.

Jamie's style has earned The Globe and Mail's praise as "one of the most searching musical intellects and 10 of the nimblest fingers in the business." He has enthralled audiences in North America and Europe, counting diplomats and dignitaries among his rapt listeners.

A consummate professional, Jamie is critically acclaimed as both a soloist and as a chamber musician. He tours as the pianist for Canada's foremost chamber ensemble, Gryphon Trio, and performs with major Canadian and international symphony orchestras. With three JUNO recording awards and many other nominations from his vast discography, Jamie Parker continues to graciously strive to do it all.

For more than two decades, cellist and producer Roman Borys has distinguished himself as one of Canada's leading artistic voices. A founding member of the three-time Juno Award-winning Gryphon Trio, Roman has


released 22 acclaimed recordings on Analekta, Naxos, and other labels; toured internationally since 1993; and broken new artistic ground through cross-genre collaborations and multimedia performances.

Honours include 11 nominations and three Juno Awards for Classical Album of the Year. In 2013, Canada Council for the Arts presented Gryphon Trio with the prestigious Walter Carsen Prize for Excellence in the Performing Arts. In 2015, Roman received an Honorary Doctorate from Carleton University, in Ottawa, as recognition for his contributions to the community.

As Artistic Director of the Ottawa Chamber Music Society, from 2007 to 2020, Roman programmed the summer Ottawa Chamberfest (among the world's largest chamber music festivals); a highly successful fall-winter concert series; and a suite of community engagement and education initiatives, which included sensory friendly concerts for families with children on the autism spectrum.

Deeply committed to classical music outreach and audience development, Roman conceived, developed, and produced the Gryphon Trio's flagship educational program, Listen Up!, in communities across Canada. Listen Up! now has two permanent hubs in Ottawa and Etobicoke, Ontario.

With Gryphon Trio members Annalee Patipatanakoon and Jamie Parker, Roman leads Orford Music Academy's Piano Trio Workshop, and the Classical Music Summer Programs at Banff Centre for Arts and Creativity. Gryphon Trio are ensemble-in-residence at the Isabel Bader Centre for the Performing Arts in Kingston, Ontario and artists-in-residence at Trinity College, University of Toronto, Roman lives and works in Toronto.

As one of the youngest Beares International Violin Society Young Artists, Starla was the loan recipient of a 1/2 size 19th century Hill cello and a 3/4 size 1808 Lorenzo Ventapane. Starla was a Yellow Barn Young Artist in 2022 and 2023.

Mio Imai, age 13, studies violin with Kimberly Fisher, the principal second violin of The Philadelphia Orchestra. Mio made her first appearance as a soloist with the New York Session Symphony at the age of 9, followed by Rowan String Ensemble of Rowan University, Temple University Youth Chamber Orchestra, Old York Road Symphony, Ambler Symphony, Main Line Symphony Orchestra, Bucks County Symphony Orchestra in the US, and FVG Orchestra, Accademia d'Archi Arrigoni in Italy.

Concerto in D Major, Op. 35 (I. Allegro moderato) Lauren Yoon, 15 years old, is a violinist studying with Professor Masao Kawasaki at the Juilliard School Pre-College Division. Prior to attending Juilliard in 2019, Lauren studied with Paul Arnold of the Philadelphia Orchestra. Lauren is a member of the Juilliard Pre-College Orchestra and the Grammy Award winning New York Youth Symphony. Also an avid chamber musician, Lauren is a founding member of the Happy Feat Trio since 2022 with notable achievements in community outreach and chamber music competitions.

Lauren is a 2024 National YoungArts Winner with Distinction in Classical Music. Lauren's recent top prizes include the overall grand prize of Walgreens Concerto Competition, Vancouver Symphony Young Artist Competition, Hill Concerto Competition, Ensemble 212 Young Artist Competition, Vienna International Music Competition, and the Camerata Young Artist Competition, just to list a few. In 2021, Lauren was the youngest finalist of the Stulberg International Strings Competition.

In 2022, Lauren attended the Morningside Music Bridge, a full scholarship summer festival in Boston, MA, where she performed in masterclasses with Midori Goto, William van der Sloot and Mauricio Fuks. She also attended the Valissima Institute Conducting Program where she passionately studied and conducted the last movement of the Beethoven Symphony No.2 in D Major with an orchestra. The following year, Lauren spent the summer in Salzburg where she participated in the Mozarteum International Summer Academy and performed in masterclasses by Zakhar Bron, Paul Roczek, and Michaela Girardi.

In addition to her musical achievements, Lauren has an unwavering commitment to serving the community. As a member of the Back to Bach community outreach program since 2020, Lauren is dedicated to reaching out to young kids and sharing her love for music and making genuine personal connections. In 2022-2023, Lauren also volunteered her time to teaching a young music student how to play the violin through "Raise the Bar", a non-profit organization providing free music lessons for underprivileged students.

Yanzi Zhou, a 14-year-old cellist from Wuhan, China, started cello lessons at 8 years old with Lili Liu. Yanzi is currently studying cello performance at the attached middle school of Wuhan Conservatory of Music under Associate Professor Bing Li.

Notable prizes Yanzi has achieved include the Outstanding Performance Award in the Aiqin Cup International Cello Competition, the first prize in the Academic Cup Cello Competition and the Europe-China Crescendo International Music Competition. In 2022, she showcased her artistry in her solo recital concert and was selected as a candidate for the Shanghai Music Prodigy Search. She has performed with the Shanghai Opera Symphony Orchestra, under the baton of Maestro Muhai Tang.

Yanzi was admitted to the Morningside Music Bridge Program (MMB) in 2023 and 2024 with a full scholarship and had the opportunity to perform at the Emerging Artists Recital at the NEC. As a member of the MMB String Orchestra, she collaborated with other musicians in a performance of the work of Bela Bartok.

The esteemed teachers from whom Yanzi has taken masterclasses include Jian Wang, Jiwu Li, Li-Wei Qin, Laurence Lesser, Hans Jørgen Jensen, Tomasz Strahl, Andres Diaz, Lluis Claret, Clara Minhye Kim etc. Yanzi has performed in prestigious venues such as Jaguar Shanghai Symphony Hall, Wuhan Qintai Concert Hall, NEC's Jordan Hall and Williams Hall. In addition to her solo endeavors, she is passionate about chamber music and has performed Antonin Dvorak's Piano Quartet with fellow musicians.

In July 2024, she will perform with the Wuhan Philharmonic Orchestra.
